

FLIPPIN' DISASTER FOR NEW VEHICLES

Taranaki Daily News 10 April 2002

Brand new vehicles worth close to \$300,000 were totalled when a car transporter crashed on a notorious bend in the Awakino Gorge yesterday. The Auckland based transporter was carrying seven vehicles on its trip to south Taranaki when it lost control at 7.30 am.

Its rear double-level trailer unit crashed into a bank, ripping a \$90 000 four wheel drive Jeep Grand Cherokee V8 and \$76 000 Chrysler Grand Voyager people mover off the top level and on to the roadway and then rolled, crushing another Grand Voyager as well as a \$50 000 Mazda Tribute 4WD.

Three more vehicles - a BMW 325ti Compact, Mazda SP20 and a Ford Ute - were carried on the front unit and escaped unscathed because it and the trucks cabin remained upright.

Constable Jono Erwood, of Mokau Police, said it was not known at this stage what caused the crash. But another truck driver, who did not wish to be named, told the Daily News that the bend on which the truck crashed had been the scene of numerous accidents. "It's got deep guttering on the side of the road and if you get your wheels stuck in there you can get into big trouble," said the driver, who with dozens of other motorists was stuck in the gorge while wreckage was being cleared. "That's obviously what happened with this poor guy. The guttering would have flicked the top part of the transporter into the bank and torn the vehicles away."

The days are starting to get longer and dare I say it worst of the winter weather is behind us again. Although it's cool outside, we are all still at risk of UV skin damage. This time of year can be worse than the hot and sunny weather as we don't automatically think sunscreen when it's not blazing hot. NZ has one of the highest rates of skin cancers in the world – second only to Australia (this is a trophy we are happy to let them keep). We do however, hold the dubious honour of having highest death rates from melanoma in the world.

There are two main types of skin cancer: melanoma and non-melanoma. The most common non-melanoma tumours are basal cell carcinoma and squamous cell carcinoma and are often removed or treated by your GP or skin specialist.

If you have any new or changing skin lumps, bumps or lesions please have them checked out by your GP or dermatologist. If caught early they are easier to treat. Bottom line is the more trips around the sun you have taken the longer your overall exposure time to the effects of the sun and the greater your risk. The old rhyme of slip, slop, slap is never out of date.

September is a busy month as whitebait season starts and the number of people in the area increases to chase the white gold. Keep an eye out for each near the waterways enjoy the fruits of your labour (go light on the flour in the fritter).

BEYOND THE AWA IN CLIFTON

Thanks to all those who took their time to vote in the by-election. We had a return of about 27% which while looks low is actually quite typical unfortunately. Anyway, you have all selected Judy Tulloch to be part of the Community Board and I look forward to working with her.

Council is well into the triannual planning cycle now as we tweak the plan for the next 10 years and a key part of this are the Community Board Plans. Our top 5 priorities based on community responses are;

- 1. Roading infrastructure and transport, (no cycleways needed up here)
- 2. Water and waste management
- 3. Community and environment
- 4. Recreation and Tourism, and finally
- 5. Regional Growth

No doubt you would have seen the public kick back of the rates increase and it is good to hear that the new CE is mandated with a review of Council structure to make sure every dollar is delivering value. It's been quite some time since this has happened and there will be fat in the system. I hope this also extends into the contracts used to deliver services as anything council seems to be a lot more expensive than what we would normally expect in the private sector. This will all wash though in the Long-Term Plan delivery.

Last month the council roading team tidied up the Clifton Road verge opposite the boat ramp park and with the plants provided a team of locals got these in the ground. In the years to come these are going to look great and a special thanks to Mike Brown and all those who gave a hand on the day. The road verge is now a community orchard, and it is now up to the local community to maintain and care for these trees. There is quite a variety which should provide crops for people to gather from most of the year. It is now up to us to see that it reaches its potential.

Be careful what we vote for

What's important at your place right now?

Is it the cost of living, the price of meat, eggs and vegetables?

Do you break out in a sweat every time you fill up the car?

Is the interest rate on your mortgage constantly on your mind?

Maybe you feel unsafe due to rising crime and ram raids?

Is your business or farm is being drowned in regulations.

Has your child been affected by the amount of disrupted schooling this year alone?

When was the last time you managed to see your doctor?

These questions are among the issues you'll be considering on October 14.

So I encourage everyone to look closely at the policies on offer not the personalities. Because the New Zealand we know, and love, is depending on it.

For the past six years, we've seen the economy, infrastructure, biggest export earners, education and health systems, rural communities, law and order, among others fall victim to the ideology of our current government.

We're in a recession and don't know exactly how bad the books are. Meanwhile the confidence of our food producers, our biggest earners, has slumped to a record low under Labour.

We've become a nation divided over governance, language and resources, of haves versus have nots, of failing systems and lawlessness. A country where people can walk out of a store without paying for what they have taken without consequence.

Not content, Labour in their final weeks have passed Three Waters and two of their three RMA replacement bills; taken GST off fresh fruit and vegetable but added a staggered 12c fuel tax.

I know it's what the majority of Kiwis voted for in 2020.

Labour is the only political party, since MMP was introduced, to enjoy the luxury of governing without the need of political partners in their second term. But the window to reverse the monumental damage done since 2017 is almost closed.

There are those who might say 'Why would you want to even become government?' given the epic job ahead of whoever wins.

It's a valid question.

Getting the economy pumping again, household costs under control, repealing legislation, underdoing red tape, resetting systems and fixing broken ones, restoring roads, education, health and law and order systems — just some of the urgent priorities — won't be easy and will take time.

National has announced many of its policies and countered those put forward by others.

We are builders and our previous terms in government attest to that. We just need the might of a majority vote to do that.
