

## Mokau Ratepayers Association (MRA) - Meeting with Waitomo District Council (WDC)

Minutes of Meeting of the Mokau Ratepayers Association and Waitomo District Council, held in the Mokau Hall Saturday, 6 January 2024.

**Present from WDC:** John Robertson (Mayor), Gavin Todd (Councillor), Ben Smit (Chief Executive)

John Robertson updated the meeting on the activities of Council and the Elected Members and some of the work that had been undertaken in Mokau – primarily the completion of new public toilets and sewerage drainage upgrade and the upgrade of truck and car parking.

Discussion and comments from the MRA centred around:

Issue	Outcome	Council Actions
Solid Waste Collection on Te Mahoe Road. Why is there no kerbside collection up this road and residents need to bring waste to the end of the road?	This has been discussed with our contractor EnviroWaste. They are unwilling to collect due to the size (length) of their kerbside collection vehicle. They indicate there is inadequate turn around for their truck to turn around safely. Council to approach EnviroWaste again to see if they are willing to do kerbside collection. If they aren't then Council will engage with all residents on Te Mahoe Road to see if they will want to continue with current level of service or discontinue the service completely and have the charges reduced from their rates from 1 July 2024.	Envirowaste have confirmed that they won't do kerbside collection on Te Mahoe Road.  Next step is to engage with Te Mahoe Road ratepayers regarding the options of:  1. continuing with current service (with cost of rates) or  2. Discontinuing collection completely at the end of Te Mahoe Road (and removing the refuse collection rate for these ratepayers).

Residents concerned that, if Point Road erodes away that this will be a major loss for landowners and there will also be no access to the beach and this would be a major issue for the future of Mokau.  Residents asked what Council could do to allow them to protect their properties from coastal erosion without the need for investment by Council itself.  Wayne Fairhurst was going to collect resident's questions regarding coastal erosion and send them to Council.  From this a report would go back to residents before the proposed meeting with WRC and WDC Elected Members and expert staff.	Natural Hazard Area that indicates that 'This property is located in Coastal Hazard Area Prohibited Activity'. The relevant District Plan Chapters are sent with the LIM report.  The aerial maps in the LIM show that in lots of cases half these sections are in the sea which should be a strong indication of an issue.
SH3 traffic island in Mokau township.	There was very strong feeling from the meeting that the traffic island in the middle of Mokau should be removed because it is a high safety and vehicle manoeuvrability issue.	Request sent to Waka Kotahi indicating the resident's strong preference for the traffic island to be removed. It is their decision as to whether it is removed.



SH3 vehicle accessibility	The residents of 6 North Road, SH3 are unable to access SH3 directly since the Waka Kotahi roadworks (and lifting of the road) late last year. This is a Waka Kotahi issue so Chief Executive has emailed them on behalf of the resident.	Service Request sent to Waka Kotahi by Chief Executive.
Water quality of waterways around Mokau.	Does Waikato     Regional Council     monitor and report     on this?	There is currently a testing site located at Awakau Road in Mokau that tests the water in the Mokau River. The testing location can be found by following the attached link <a href="https://www.lawa.org.nz/explore-data/waikato-region/river-quality/mokau-river/mokau-river-at-awakau-rd/">https://www.lawa.org.nz/explore-data/waikato-region/river-quality/mokau-river/mokau-river-at-awakau-rd/</a> The website provides the following trends for the last five years:  • E.coli - very likely degrading. • Clarity - Intermediate (which is considered to mean neutral). • Turbidity - Intermediate (which is considered to mean neutral). • Nitrogen - likely degrading. • Total oxidised nitrogen - Intermediate (which is considered to mean neutral). • Dissolved inorganic nitrogen - Not assessed. • Ammoniacal nitrogen - Very likely degrading. • Nitrate nitrogen - Intermediate (which is considered to mean neutral). • Dissolved reactive phosphorous - likely improving. • Total phosphorus - likely degrading.
