WHAT'S HAPPENING AT THE MUSEUM

Tēnā tatou katoa

The "MUSEUM" sign is finally up, and has now finally answering the question on all those minds looking across the road saying to themselves, "what is that place?"

The museum committee has begun the 2025-26 planning cycle. It seems to come around so fast these days and while appearing to be a long way off, the first round of funding applications closes in Nov 24. Museum activity is always based around projects, some big like the new frontage, and others small like the rotunda refurbishment. Funders like to have something tangible that they can connect societal value with. The 2024-25 project is the Tongapōrutu Interactive display which is due to begin in Oct with the hopeful success of the last round of funding. So far, we have secured 35% of the funds with the rest due in Oct, fingers crossed. This is a \$90k project and we are all looking forward to delivering it for the benefit of the community

This brings me back to the 2025-26 planning. The committee is looking for ideas that will enhance the regions historic heritage which is then presented back to the community for all to share. We are also looking for ideas that will further connect the museum with the local community. Not all project funds have to be spent within the walls of the museum building. For example, this could be some interpretative signage in the township itself. Anyway, we are looking for new inspiring ideas from the community for the benefit of the community. If you have something to share pop into the museum and see Kath or Jennifer

The short documentary collection continues to grow as we record things that are still active in our community today but extend back many years. The next one is recording some history on the Tainui Rugby Club and those who were at the wet game last month may have noticed the cameras out there. The collection of these short video stories will be treasured in the years ahead.

On August 30th 10am down at the St Johns lounge, archaeologist Ivan Bruce to talk about the archaeology of this area. Ivan is New Plymouth based and has worked extensively in this area. He will be a very interesting speaker.

You never know the talent that is out in a community until you provide a space for people to share their works. And the Mokau Camera Club is one of these opportunities. Gee, there is some real talent within, and the works displayed in the Gallery is a must see with the opportunity to purchase some prints.

In our planning it is important for us to keep an open mind and listen to what the community wants. The whakataukī this month talks about "whakairo whānui"" or broadminded. He rangi tā matawhāiti, he rangi tā matawhānui. "A person with a narrow vision has a restricted horizon; a person with wide vision has plentiful opportunities"

SEABIRD NEST SITE TO BE FENCED OFF

Taranaki's first predator-proof fence will ensure that a native sea bird remains in the region.

The grey-faced petrel has virtually disappeared from Taranaki, but a colony of 60 at Rapanui, 2 km north of Tongaporutu river will soon be protected by a 600m fence.

A cliff-edge conservation area of half a hectare has been established by the Taranaki Tree Trust and landowners.

Once the fence has been built and the birds fly out to sea, predators living inside the boundary will be either poisoned or trapped, Taranaki Tree Trust facilitator Maggie Bayfield said.

The grey-faced petrel colony at Rapanui was of national significance because it was the only known colony breeding on the mainland. It is also the southernmost colony on the west coast of the North Island.

The fence was crucial for the Rapanui population and would benefit breeding adults. Seven years ago DOC banded birds and discovered that once chicks fledged, they stayed out at sea for six to eight years before returning to the same nesting site to breed. To establish this area by planting and creating burrows is a long process in terms of a chick hatching, growing and fledging.

The fence would prove beneficial for other vulnerable wildlife, such as kiwi. Two other burrowing seabirds, the diminutive diving petrel and the fluttering shearwater, nest at the site.



CLIFTON COMMUNITY BOARD

BEYOND THE AWA IN CLIFTON

The last Community Board meeting was held in the Tongaporutu hall. What a great turn out and it was good to hear the concerns central to the district. Council provided an update on which roads are getting what done to them over the summer. It was also great news to hear that council has had a bit of a rethink around closing the transfer station. This is directly attributed to those who made their voices heard in the LTP process. Be assured, they wanted to do it, and this is one up for the democratic process.

However, it is clear that the current model is expensive and limited. Council have determined to discuss options and ideas directly with the community. This is now our opportunity to tell them our needs, what we would like to have available and how these services can be delivered in a cost-effective manner. Tongaporutu is not the only rural community facing similar issues and the learnings from this will be passed onto other rural communities across the district, of which Clifton has 3, Tongaporutu, Uruti and Okoki.

Every so often the Freedom Camping Bylaw comes up for public consultation, and right now you can have your say. Included in the document is to prohibit all Freedom Camping from the Rapanui Reserve area. The Community Board proposed this as there are plans to upgrade the carpark. This area has a number of sensitive ecological issues and being so close to the main road it was also considered a safety risk, and we wanted to encourage campers to go to the established freedom camping area at Tongaporutu where there are facilities. "God is Love" continued

Last month I mentioned that we should not think of God's love in light of the fact that we know that God is holy, righteous, and just - but instead we need to rethink God's holiness, righteousness, and justice in light of the fact that we know that God *is* love and how in doing so challenges the many things we may have learned about God. And that this means God loves us is for no other reason beyond the fact that God loves us.

In 1 John4:10 the apostle tells us

This is what love is: it is <u>not</u> that we have loved God, but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the means by which our sins are forgiven.

And later in v19

We love because God first loved us.

And what this means is that our very ability to love is that because God first loved us. Now many people who love God often say in prayer "We love you God because ... " and then fill in some of the many reasons we have for loving God. And while it is entirely appropriate for us to say and pray, "We love you God *because* ... " - God never actually says this to us.

God never says to us, "I love you because ... Because of what? Because you are so faithful, obedient, or whatever else we think God might be impressed by? Thinking this way turns God's relationship with us into a kind of contract - "If you are obedient (enough) to me [says God], then for this reason I will love you".

But what "God is love" means, is that while our love for God has everything to do with who God is - God's love for us has nothing to do with who we are. Our love for God has everything to do with who God is and what God has done for us - and God's love for us is the same - it has everything to do with who God is and what kind of God, God has elected to be toward us.

In our insecurity and fear we have the mistaken idea that if we are lovely then we will be loved. And in so many ways we unwittingly reinforce this terrible contractual way of thinking. How many times do we, in effect, say to our children or our spouses, "You are lovely" and then love them - but in this way subtly create the impression that the reason we love them is because they are lovely. The implication being is that for them to *continue* to be loved by us they must *continue* to be lovely to us.

But the truth is God does not love us because we are lovely - rather we become lovely because we are loved. It is precisely because God loves us for no other reason than the fact that God is love that we become lovely. In other words, show me a truly lovely person and I'll show you someone who knows with assurance they are truly loved. But show me someone who thinks that *if* they are lovely then they will be loved, and I'll show you a person who is deeply insecure.

It's all in the Soil by Barbara Kuriger, MP for Taranaki-King Country

Soil.

Many from outside the farming community take it for granted, and that is understandable because, for them, it is simply the medium in which grass grows.

But farmers know it is much more.

Soil also filters and purifies our water, reduces flooding, helps regulate the atmosphere and plays a crucial role in driving the carbon and nitrogen cycles. It is also key to tackling climate change.

The true impact of soil on all aspects of our life came to light when I watched an incredible movie that the rural advocacy charitable trust, Quorum Sense, brought to New Zealand.

"Six Inches of Soil" is a new grassroots UK documentary that shares the inspiring story of three young British farmers transforming how they produce food to heal the soil, improve our health, and provide for local communities.

Soil is the essence of farming—of life—but for most urban New Zealanders, that goes no further than what they see—green, verdant pastures.

It's only when we dig deep into it, beneath the surface, that we discover an additional benefit. Soil is an excellent storage medium for carbon, reducing emissions into the atmosphere, enriching the soil and its productivity, and maximising water infiltration and filtration.

New Zealand farmers know this. They are aware of the organic benefits of carbon retention in soil and actively cultivate it. Yet, the sequestration of carbon in the soil and the consequent reduction of carbon emissions are either not known by the wider public (which is understandable) or, more insidiously, largely ignored or obscured by certain sectors of society that claim farmers are major contributors to climate change.

Movies like "Six Inches of Soil" point out the opposite, which is why I was so encouraged by Quorum Sense touring it through New Zealand.

But movies can only do so much. I have long advocated that we should do more about the science of soil—studying it and improving it. For example, we could find ways to improve water retention to mitigate droughts. And then we should be telling people about it so that they get the good oil on soil—that it is a lot more than just green pasture. Once people understand that, perhaps they will stand beside New Zealand farmers in protecting and nurturing our land.


