

WHAT'S HAPPENING AT THE MUSEUM

Tēnā tatou katoa

For many years now the museum has hosted the community book swap. This used to be an old fridge on the top landing which served well in keeping the books dry and accessible. With the build of the new ramp the fridge disappeared as we worked out somewhere new to put the library. Once the veranda roof went over the middle doors the old phone box was the obvious place, although it was a bit wonky and needed some TCL. Thanks to the team of volunteers the phone box, (which by the way as rumour goes was the one outside the Tongaporutu general store) now has a new floor and is plumb and secure. So now the community book swap library is freely available again for all to enjoy. Books are displayed better and there are some games and DVDs available as well. So, help yourself to anything in there, but remember while hosted by the museum its contents come from you, so give back what you have read for someone else to enjoy

Talking about volunteers, the museum runs on them and without those who dedicate sometime out of their week it would not exist. Recently we have lost a couple due to health issues and are now desperate for some more people to help out. If you can spare a few hours in your weekly routine, please consider helping us out. The annual funding cycle is about to end and much of our budget for next year now swings on the outcome of a lotteries grant this month. Your museum is more than collecting and archiving old stuff, it is a mechanism where people can connect with the past and with each other, and much of our ongoing activity is community focussed. Without the community connection you have to ask why bother, or what is its significance? The museum belongs to the entire community and must maintain its relevance and connection, but keeping it breathing does require funding, so fingers crossed that Lotteries comes through and we get to live another day

Continued this month in the Art Gallery is the Arno and Dimphy de Vaan exhibition showing their eclectic collection of print and sculpture. Arno creates by planning, measuring and precision work, while Dimphy plans a starting point and then lets intuition direct her creative practices. There will be hand pulled original prints, some even created with a chainsaw, sculptures from andesite as well as clay, and other artforms on show. This is well worth seeing with some items already sold.

Reflecting on personal and community history brings insight, depth and purpose into life and culture. And while the past is not always pretty reflecting upon it does influence future decisions. I like this whakataukī about the Hōhonutanga or depth of a person and a community; He kino ra, he kino nō tāu ō te wai. *"I may not be good-looking but I am the deepest part of the river"*. And aren't we all drawn to people like this

AWAKINO MEN UNHURT WHEN PLANE CRASHES INTO MOUNTAIN PEAK

Party of three climb down 7000 feet to safety

Taranaki Daily News 20 November 1950

Wonderful luck saved three men from a grim death when their Auster aeroplane crashed into the side of a mountain in the Southern Alps on Friday. The men scrambled out of the wrecked machine unscathed but for bruises and minor abrasions.

It was an amazing escape for the three men, Mr P Legg, Fielding, pilot of the plan which belonged to the Middle Districts' Aero Club, Palmerston North, and his passengers, Messrs W Tatham and B T McDavitt, Awakino, who were on a flight from Omaka to Hokitika to attend the funeral of Mr N Morris, a 36 year old contractor who was killed in a bulldozer accident on Mr McDavitt's Awakino farm on Monday.

The pilot said that the fact the aircraft struck a patch of snow undoubtedly helped save him and his two friends.

Mr Legg said that two or three minutes before the crash he was flying at about 5500 feet which left the aircraft possibly 900 feet under the cloud ceiling. Suddenly the Auster whisked up in an air current to 7500 feet and Mr Legg found himself flying blind through a thick layer of cloud. Then he found himself caught in a tremendous down draught. This brought the machine down to 6000 feet in two or three seconds. Just as Mr Legg was pulling the aircraft up again, the crash came.

After accomplishing a long, arduous climb the men came out at a hut on the Ada Station about 30 miles from Hanmer Springs

God is a relational God (Part 2)

Last month I introduced the thought that thinking of God primarily as a relational being changes our world view of who God is fundamentally and thereby our view of humanity in the world.

Understanding God as a relational God is something we see in John's Gospel 1:1

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was <u>with</u> <u>God</u>, and the Word <u>was God</u>.

God is a relational God. "With God" means distinct from, but in close relationship with God. And "Was God" means having the same being and nature as God. This means that the Word or Jesus Christ, is both *distinct from* God thus allowing for the freedom of individual personhood, yet also *one with* God thus allowing for a relationship of intimacy and oneness.

And what this means that within the being of God there is a relationship of "with-ness" between Father, Son, and Holy Spirit – a relationship of loving oneness that nevertheless gives room for the freedom of individual distinctiveness.

John 17:26 gives us a glimpse into the inner life of God's relationality. Jesus prays:

"Father, I made you known to them, and I will continue to do so, in order that <u>the love you have for me may be in</u> <u>them</u>.

Here Jesus reveals two amazing truths.

First, Jesus reveals the inner relationality of God. "<u>The love</u> you have for me".

And second, Jesus reveals that it is God's desire to *welcome us* into this same relationship of love *"That the love you have for me <u>may be in them."</u>*

Love by its very nature is relational – to love there must be both a giver and a receiver, both a lover and one who is loved. This means that at the core of the very being of God is loving relationality. God is a relational God, a God of intimacy and oneness, yet at the same time a God who gives room for freedom and individual personhood. And John tells us that God has come to us in and as Jesus Christ to invite us and enable us to participate in the loving relationality of God as lovers and as those who are loved!

And because God is a relational God, this means God has created us to be relational beings also. This is because it is only *as* relational beings that we are able to enjoy genuine relationships of love – with God and with each other.

As human beings we long for relationships of *love* in which we can enjoy closeness and intimacy, yet at the same time we long for freedom and space in our relationships whereby our distinctiveness as individuals is safeguarded and respected.

But if we understand ourselves primarily as rational beings or creative beings this risks completely bypassing relationship. We can be rational and creative as solitary individuals without any belonging or community – but we can't be loving! Love by its very nature is relational.

And this is the great tragedy of our Western European cultural heritage – by privileging our intellects and our abilities over our relationships, this so often leads to a profound sense of loneliness and disconnection from others.

And so, I am convinced that the best way to understand Genesis 1: 26:

"Let us make humankind in our image and in our likeness" Is to understand it relationally.

BEYOND THE AWA IN CLIFTON

October marked a new 10 year service agreement with Waste Management and as a result a shiny new yellow waste recycling bin has turned up in the gravel pit which now includes plastics, cans and paper. This is good news as the community has been asking for this for a long time. Now it is up to us to make sure the facility is not abused as gross contamination means the whole pod ends up going to landfill. The Jack Trash contract ends in May next year and we are still working on an alternative for general waste.

In the 2025-26 budget Council is upgrading the Rapanui Reserve carpark to include a sealed lead on/off onto SH3 to improve the safety of getting on and off the main road. They will also increase the gravel area for parking, but all this is still 12 months away. In the meantime, council has committed to build up the leading edge to SH3 making is safer to access the reserve carpark

As we head into summer, we are seeing increased visitor activity at the Umukaha Point lookout. This is fast becoming a popular location to take in the vista and a few photos. As a result, Pilot Rd is getting busier and there is limited parking. To gauge the level of activity council is putting a traffic counter on Pilot Rd over the holiday period. This data will help us understand what future infrastructure will be required.
